FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

IWSE has had an eventful and exciting 2019. We continue to meet the needs of our children and families, walking alongside our parents to help ensure success and readiness for all early childhood students. IWSE has been moving forward with our strategic plan, implementing expansion and growth in the prenatal to 3 space and developing new collaborations and partnerships. We believe the services and programs at IWSE are helping to lead the way in 0-5 early childhood education and preparing our children and families for success.

IWSE has continued to operate two classroom-based programs serving 86 children and their families. These programs, which are both NAEYC accredited and designated with the ExceleRate Gold Circle of Quality, provide comprehensive full-day services to our families and children. As a delegate agency, we partner closely with the Federal Early Head Start grantee, School District 65, to serve the largest Early Head Start Program in the City of Evanston. We provide developmental screening and comprehensive educational, disability and mental health services. We focus on the social-emotional development of all our children and provide a nurturing, loving and supportive environment for them to thrive. Teen Baby Nursery, which focuses on parents ages 14 to 23 and their children, has operated for over 30 years and continues to serve the most vulnerable parents in Evanston, with a special focus on mentoring and support for our youngest families.

IWSE's Prevention Initiative Home Visiting model, funded by the Illinois State Board of Education, continues to partner with Skokie-Morton Grove School District 69 in an initiative called Ready for Success. Ready for Success is a comprehensive collaboration that focuses on a continuum of care from birth through elementary school. This 5-year grant will continue to serve children and families in the Skokie and Morton Grove communities and provide services for hundreds of children and families, many who are new immigrants and refugees in the community. IWSE and District 69 have begun implementation in 2019 of a research model in partnership with National Louis University, Northeastern University, Northwestern University and the University of California to demonstrate the impact and efficacy of home visiting services for our youngest learners and their families.

We have recently completed the construction of the "Tom Kendall Gross Motor and Play Space" that is accessible to all of the 70 children at our Baby Toddler Nursery. This construction project was generously supported by the Kendall Family Foundation and the City of Evanston's Community Development Block Grant. This project will provide critical indoor gross motor and play space during cold and inclement weather. We look forward to sharing and enjoying the space with our children, staff, families, supporters and friends.

We will continue to build strong, strategic partnerships and be advocates for quality early care and education with the help of volunteers, the IWSE board of directors, and community partnerships. We are very proud of the year's accomplishments and look forward to meeting the needs of our parents, staff and community.

OUR FISCAL YEAR 2019: THE YEAR IN NUMBERS



155 children received high-quality early childhood education through our two center-based programs and our Family Support Program.



103 children were living in households at or below the federal poverty level.



150 children received regular developmental screenings.
All center-based children had medical exams and dental screenings when age-appropriate.







116 classroom-based children were assessed and noted to make progress across developmental domains.



57 children were identified as needing support to address learning challenges.



57 children were connected to ongoing supports that address learning challenges.







150 parents reported more positive interactions with their children.



27 infants and toddlers of teenaged and young adult parents received services in our Teen Baby Nursery.



60 children were served by the home visiting program.

OUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- ♣ The Infant Welfare Society of Evanston signed MOU agreements with 7 research institutions including Northwestern University, Northeastern Illinois University, Erikson Institute, National Louis University, Northern Illinois University, University of Illinois at Chicago and University of California. These research partners are working with our Home Visiting program and The Ready for Success (RFS) Initiative in Skokie and Morton Grove. The RFS initiative has a birth through 3rd grade focus and helps children move through the transitions of early childhood to kindergarten. Our longitudinal research will follow children all the way through the 12th grade using a shared database between District 69 and Niles Township High School, District 219.
- *IWSE held their 9th annual "Warm Your Palate" event raising over \$85,000 with 200 guests. During the event we honored our long-term staff, some with over 40 years of service. We also honored some of our past Board members of the organization.
- We completed construction of the Tom Kendall Gross Motor and Play Space which is a 750 sq. ft. indoor space for our infants and toddlers to play during cold and inclement weather. All 70 children at Baby Toddler Nursery will be able to utilize this space. We will also be able to use this location as a training and teacher development venue for over 30 teachers and staff. In addition, our special needs and developmental experts will use this space for gross motor and physical therapy.
- Both of our classroom-based facilities have maintained their NAEYC accreditation and are highly rated with the Illinois ExceleRate Gold Circle of Quality.
- The IWSE Home Visiting Program has served over 60 families in our new Skokie and Morton Grove community with Ready for Success, which serves predominantly immigrant and refugee low-income families. The Skokie and Morton

- Grove community has few services for prenatal to three-year old infants and toddlers, we are working together to address this unmet need.
- ♠ In 2019, our Home Visiting staff, working as part
 of the Ready for Success initiative, was asked to
 move into the District 69 administrative building.
 This building became which has created our first
 official staff site in Skokie in over 110 years of our
 operations.

THE WAY WE WORK

- ❖ IWSE maintained its commitment to quality through our ratio of 3 teachers in the classroom for every 8 children.
- Every child was screened for delays or disturbances within 45 days of entry into the program and re-screened at regular intervals. Staff administers the Ages & Stages Questionnaire (ASQ3) and the Ages & Stages Questionnaire (ASQ: SE2) Developmental Screening Tool.
- Additional screenings occurred as warranted based on ongoing observation by staff and parents.
- Children with different learning and developmental disabilities were engaged in an inclusive early childhood education community that also incorporates families from all socio-economic levels.
- *Every infant was assigned a primary care teacher responsible for changing, feeding and settling at naptime to strengthen their sense of security.
- Professional training was a major focus and is ongoing. Professional development opportunities were provided at all levels to expand their skills and knowledge of early childhood education.

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT

Our goal at IWSE is to establish a partnership with parents of the children in our programs. We are dedicated to maintaining open lines of communication. All of our families are encouraged to play an active role in the programming and structure of our organization including membership in a parent policy council.

In addition to parent/teacher conferences, IWSE has monthly parenting workshops and educational programs on such topics as financial literacy, infant mental health, and parent/child relationship building.

Other opportunities for involvement include volunteering in the classroom, participating in "Week of the Young Child" activities and classroom social events which have included musical performances, cookouts and dance lessons.

Once again, families from our community participated in the Family 2 Family Holiday Gift program. Families adopted less fortunate IWSE families to brighten their holidays.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

IWSE's close cooperation with other early childhood educational programs improves the quality of each program. In 2019, IWSE joined with 9 other Evanston non-profit organizations called "The Collective" in a grant by Evanston Cradle to Career and The United Way. These organizations have taken on the challenge of creating systems-wide change and increasing interaction and engagement of all of these organizations. In 2019 over 200 staff from 9 organizations came together for a full day cross-training and dialogue about the shared purpose and opportunity that exists to impact families and children.

Each IWSE site has a Family Advocate who works closely with families to resolve problems they face such as homelessness, unemployment or domestic disturbances. Family Advocates make referrals to local agencies and assist families in identifying community resources they need, including the Moran Center, Metropolitan Family Services, Connections for the Homeless, Bundled Blessings, Family Promise, and many more.

The IWSE Executive Director, Stephen Vick serves as the chair of the Evanston Early Childhood Council (EECC). They regularly meet in Evanston and work with over 40 early childhood centers, both full day and half day programs throughout the city.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

Health, safety and nutrition are of paramount importance in our early childhood sites. We maintain accurate records of physicals and immunizations. Parents are reminded regularly of the importance of wellness and are encouraged to attend workshops on nutrition and other wellness practices. Additional supports are provided by the services of a Health Consultant and a Speech Therapist.

IWSE has a Developmental Services Coordinator and Mental Health Consultant who meet with the teaching staff to discuss therapies and strategies for coping with children with special needs. Every child's development is assessed with the parent by the 4th day of their enrollment. Any lags in development, either social emotional, communication or physical are discussed with the parent. Individualized activities are provided for children to address any areas of concern. Parents have a variety of options including a referral to Early Intervention, having their child participate in small group therapies and an opportunity to meet with the clinical psychologist on staff. Children are then monitored monthly in all domains, including health, in monthly multi-disciplinary meetings.

SCHOOL READINESS

To prepare the children at our sites for kindergarten readiness we focus on five domains:

- Approaches to learning
- ♥ Social-Emotional Development
- Language and Communication
- Cognition
- Perceptual Motor and Physical Development

With these in mind, activities are planned for the children and individualized to each child's needs. Each child has an education plan based on tasks appropriate for his/her age and developmental level. Early literacy is a primary goal and children are read to regularly and "read" to themselves. Parents are encouraged to read to their children frequently at home and asked to complete logs on time spent reading.



Revenue






