Lastly, we have taken the time in 2022, through use of COVID-19 relief and other grant funding, to do some internal branding of our image, update our signage and visibility and complete general beautification of our spaces. Our buildings and grounds should be beautifully maintained and provide the space and environment that our children, families, and staff deserve.

FROM OUR SITE DIRECTORS



OUR MISSION

Infant Welfare Society of Evanston's mission is to deliver exceptional care and education for infants and young children and support families' efforts to be effective parents and advocates in their child's learning and development.



OUR WORK The Infant Welfare Society of Evanston serves Evanston and its surrounding communities with programs that nurture, support, and educate the whole family.

IWSE runs two full-day childcare and early education facilities — Baby Toddler Nursery and Teen Baby Nursery — and provides comprehensive parenting support and education through our Family Support Program. The National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) has accredited both of our centers, which is the gold star stamp of approval. We keep our class sizes small, encourage family participation, and celebrate each child's uniqueness and individuality. Family Support strengthens at-risk families by giving them the tools to be successful.

We aim to act as an advocate, caretaker, and champion for all our children. We believe that all families deserve access to high-quality care and early childhood education. We serve families of all socioeconomic levels, so their children can enter kindergarten ready to learn. No matter the level of need, there is a place for your child and your family at IWSE.





OUR FISCAL YEAR: 2022 IN NUMBERS



136 children received high-quality early childhood education through our two center-based programs and our Family Support Program.



64 children were living in households at or below the federal poverty level.



122 children received regular developmental screenings. All center-based children had medical exams and dental screenings when age-appropriate



122 classroom-based children were assessed and noted to make progress across developmental domains.



14 children were identified as needing supports to address learning challenges.



14 children were connected to ongoing supports that address learning challenges.



99 parents reported more positive interactions with their children.



19 infants and toddlers of teenaged and young adult parents received services in our Teen Baby Nursery.



62 children were served by the home-visiting program.

OUR ACCOMPLISHMENTS

In 2022, the third year of the COVID-19 pandemic, IWSE continued to succeed and serve our community and families. Though much of our attention was focused on recovery, enrollment and maintaining protocols for safety and COVID to keep our centers open, we worked hard to maintain our partnerships and to continue to celebrate our accomplishments.

- We continued our protocol for weekly on-site COVID testing with our staff and teachers. Safety procedures and being proactive to keep our centers open and safe continued to be critical to our success in 2022. Our weekly testing protocol, ongoing safety procedures and adaptability as an organization helped to maintain our success in 2022.
- We have continued to be committed to our services in Evanston and Niles Township. We are a lead steering committee member for both the Early Childhood Alliance and Evanston Early Childhood Council. We have maintained a strong partnership with School District 69 and the o-5 Ready for Success program as well as with School District 65 in Evanston. We are eager to continue growing our services and meeting the needs of families and children in our Evanston and Niles Township communities.
- We benefited from a mental health support grant awarded from the Northwestern University Community Partnership collaboration with the Early Childhood Council in Evanston, receiving \$60,000. This grant was designed to support our early childhood parents, families and children. These were critical funds that helped many families across our programs and services with their trauma and mental-health needs.
- We hosted a virtual fundraising event for IWSE in May of 2022 in partnership with Chef Q. Ibraheem.
 Our live cooking event had more than 100 virtual participants. The event raised funds to support our programs and services at IWSE. It was a wonderful evening enjoyed in the safety of our homes. People were cooking, eating and watching a gourmet chef

- cook a delicious Salmon Wellington and spinach dish while raising funds to support IWSE.
- In partnership with our other early childhood providers, the Evanston Early Childhood Council has worked diligently to express and present the need for city COVID relief funding to support the early childhood community.
- In addition to city American Rescue Plan Act funding, IWSE has received Restoration Grant funds. In total, most staff received almost \$4,000 in bonuses and stipends in 2022.

The way we worked, persevered and overcame challenges:

IWSE maintained its commitment to quality through our staffing. We made a commitment to retain and pay all of our staff despite the economic uncertainty.

- We continued operations during the pandemic with minimal disruptions in 2022. Occasional classroom closures and sanitization of classrooms were necessary with contact tracing and some isolated COVID positivity. We continued to follow our procedures closely and adapted when needed to updated health and safety guidelines from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Illinois Department of Public Health and other health agencies.
- We remained committed, vigilant, and strong in will and kept working and supporting children and families despite the challenges of the pandemic.
- Our staff and programming became stronger and worked to achieve the greatest success possible. Our team of teachers and leadership staff committed to our mission and delivered the highest quality services in extreme circumstances.

Despite all of these concerns and issues, 122 children were screened for developmental delays within 45 days of entry into the program, whether virtually or in person. Staff administered the Ages & Stages Questionnaire (ASQ3), Ages & Stages Questionnaire (ASQ: SE2) and Developmental Screening Tool.

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT -

Family engagement is crucial to the success of our programs. IWSE recognizes that parents are the child's first teachers, and are the first step in early learning for their children. Our goal at IWSE is to support these parents in their journey to being advocates for their children. All of our families are encouraged to be an active part of the programming and structure of our organization.

Our centers provide many opportunities for this (with childcare, transportation and meals, if applicable), including:

- Monthly parenting workshops and activities around a variety of topics, including adult education, transitions, health & safety, financial stability, parent/child relationship building and infant mental health;
- Parent committee or policy council membership;
- Home visits by center and family support staff;
- Parent-teacher conferences:
- Developmental screenings, partnering with IWSE staff, developmental specialists, and parents/caregivers;
- Volunteering in classrooms;
- Other family engagement activities

Amid ongoing health precautions, IWSE continued virtual engagement for children and families. In addition, we were happily able to host some in-person, outdoor parent engagement activities, such as the Ice Cream Social, Summertime Fun Splish Splash Water Event, and PJ Storytime Developing Nighttime Routines for Infants and Toddlers. We also were able to host a Popsicles with Parents summer event and Gardening 101 with Tots. These small doses of engagement during this time afforded us the opportunity to maintain our connections with families on a social level, all while practicing social distancing.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

IWSE has longstanding partnerships with federal, state and local government agencies, as well as an integrated network of local non-profit groups that provide complementary services in our community. Our close cooperation with other community agencies enhances our commitment to supporting parents as advocates for their children. Our families can receive the guidance and support needed to help them be successful at achieving their goals and also learn the importance of being actively involved in their children's early education. With the help of our family advocate, we connect families to resources that are specific to their own individual needs, including homelessness, unemployment, domestic disturbances, or even obtaining library cards. The Family Support Program hosted a sit-and-read session with the Skokie Public Library, which provided families with fun and engaging activities to develop their children's interest in reading.

This year we continued outreach with our community partners, mostly on Zoom and other IT platforms due to the pandemic. Some of our stronger collaborations include the Evanston Early Childhood Council (EECC) with 40 partner organizations; the Early Childhood Alliance (ECA) with more than 30 participating partners and organizations in Niles Township; and The Collective, a Cradle to Career cohort of nine organizations. The IWSE executive director, Stephen Vick, serves on the steering committee of both the EECC and the ECA.

IWSE also had the wonderful privilege of hosting Chef Q. Ibraheem for a professional development session with our staff and families about the importance of gardening and how using fresh ingredients is beneficial for all. The Family Support Program hosted a Developmental Screening Event in conjunction with the District 69 Open House. Each home visitor was equipped to administer on-the-spot developmental screenings for children ages 0-3.

Families in our communities came through in a big way around the holidays by providing gift cards so that all of our IWSE children received a gift. This community effort raised more than \$10,000 to directly support our families!

HEALTH & SAFETY

Health, safety and nutrition are of paramount importance in our early childhood sites. We maintain accurate records of physicals and immunizations. Parents are reminded regularly of the importance of wellness and are encouraged to attend workshops on nutrition and other wellness practices. Additional supports are provided by the services of a health consultant and a speech therapist.

IWSE has a developmental services coordinator and mental health consultant who meet with the teaching staff to discuss therapies and strategies for coping with children with special needs. Every child's development is assessed with the parent by the 45th day of their enrollment. Any lags in physical, social emotional, communication or other development are discussed with the parent. Individualized activities are provided for children to address any areas of concern. Parents have a variety of options, including a referral for early intervention services, having their child participate in small group therapies, and an opportunity to meet with a clinical psychologist. Children are monitored monthly in all domains, including health, in monthly multi-disciplinary meetings.

In light of the ongoing pandemic, health and safety have taken on a new look. Some therapies and weekly multi-disciplinary meetings continue to be conducted remotely, while others are now performed on site, while keeping in mind new safety procedures. Reduced classroom sizes allow for social distancing, and personal protective equipment (masks, sanitizers) is available at every area of the centers. Continual cleaning, disinfecting and ongoing training ensure the safest environment for all children and staff at IWSE.

SCHOOL READINESS

High-quality care and education is of the utmost importance through all of our services. Focusing on five central domains for school readiness ensures quality care and education for each child:

- Approaches to learning
- Social-Emotional Development
- · Language and Communication
- Cognition
- · Perceptual Motor and Physical Development

With these in mind, meaningful activities are planned each day for the children and individualized to each child's needs. Each child has an education plan based on tasks appropriate for his/her age and developmental level. Early literacy is a primary goal and children are read to regularly and "read" to themselves. Parents are encouraged to read to their children frequently at home.

This year, social-emotional awareness continued to be critical due to the pandemic. Teachers actively planned for a significant focus on this developmental area, with great benefit to the children and families in adjusting to the current situation.

Each site is accredited by NAEYC and are recipients of the ExceleRate Gold Circle of Quality. Our team is dedicated to providing exceptional instruction to all children; in support of this, ongoing professional development opportunities are provided to all staff to keep up to date and expand their knowledge in early childhood education.







COVID-19 AND THE GLOBAL PANDEMIC RESPONSE IN 2022

In the third year of the pandemic we continued to rely on our supporters and donors to ensure funding was sufficient to carry out our mission. Our partners also played an important role in allowing us to continue serving our families and children. In our current recovery from the pandemic, we also had to shift concerns to hiring staff during a national teacher shortage and making sure we retained our existing staff. A special thanks goes out to the following organizations and foundations:

The George R. Kendall Family Foundation

The foundation's incredible generosity in providing \$100,000 in unrestricted support has been vital to the fulfillment of our mission.

FDC Foundation

The foundation once again generously supported our mission with \$30,000 in funding.

The Illinois Restoration Grants

The State of Illinois supported our losses in enrollment and Child Care Assistance (CCAP) revenue with \$161,406 in subsidy grants.

City of Evanston Social Services Committee

The committee provided \$75,000 in funding to allow IWSE to provide case management to families.

The Early Head Start Program

Federal Early Head Start funding was maintained at a pre-pandemic level while allowing for additional funds to be used to support staff and teachers through stipends and bonuses.

Evanston Community Foundation

The foundation provided \$25,000 to support our programs.

Childcare Workforce Bonus

This bonus recognized the hard work of early childcare workers by providing \$43,560 in funding.

United Way of Metro Chicago

United Way supported all of our programs with \$35,000 in funding.

INGREDIENTS:

1 - 17.3 ounce package frozen puff pastry (1 sheet), thawed
2 - 3/4-inch-thick 6-ounce skinless salmon filet
10oz baby spinach
1 tablespoon fresh or dried dill
1/4 soft cup cream cheese
1 - 17 ounce conainter of cherry tomatoes
1 egg beaten to blend (for glaze)

1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter, or olive oil
