Playground Remodel at BTN and Facelift at TBN

Earlier in the year at Baby Toddler Nursery (BTN), we built a new 6 foot cedar fence for security and to beautify the play area for our children. Last month we began the process for the development of a \$30,000 renovation that will be taking place in early April 2016.

A teacher committee was formed to help select the design focus and build a concept that we would all enjoy. The hope was to create an outdoor play space that is engaging, but also brings natural elements



into the play experience. The teachers met with our designer and laid the foundation for an amazing project that will be underway shortly. We will have new play surfaces, equipment, music walls, flower beds and a gazebo for all of us to enjoy. We want to thank the Kendall Foundation for this amazing and generous donation to our facility at IWSE.

Our Teen Baby Nursery (TBN) site is also going through a transformation. We began by painting our fence and putting new signage out front. We built planter boxes and began the

renovation of the play space that will continue this Spring. Inside we are getting new carpeting for the infant room and replacing furniture and equipment. We will be renting more space from our partners at Family Focus to accommodate our Home Visiting program and additional staff positions.

Stop, Drop and Read: Cradle to Career Literacy awareness initiative across Early Childhood community in Evanston

Did you know young children need to hear 1000 stories read aloud before they begin to read themselves? The Evanston Early Childhood Community is trying to raise the level of awareness and collaboration around the importance of reading with our children at an early age to build a strong foundation of literacy skills.

This Spring a new initiative is beginning that will support our children and families health and wellness. We plan to implement a new Nutrition and Horticulture initiative. We will be building garden beds at both BTN and TBN sites.



Cooking classes will be offered for parents and staff by our partner, Cooking Matters. The hope will be to grow fresh vegetables in our own educational garden and then cook those fresh vegetables with healthy recipes. We will have the opportunity to take our children and parents on field trips to The Talking Farm in Skokie and parents will be able to go on educational workshops to the grocery store and receive free gift cards from the program.

Curriculum and lessons will be developed to use in our classrooms and engage our children in outdoor education

and learning in our garden space. Those under 2 yrs. old will be able to experience the garden with their teachers and parents as well. Our hope is to use our partners and develop a holistic approach to healthy eating, nutrition awareness and family wellness.
